

Mouse Paint is a great book to introduce the early literacy skills *Talking* and *Vocabulary* to your child. When children learn the names of colors, they use them in their everyday language to enhance their descriptions of the world around them. When your child is first learning to speak, talk to them in ways to increase their vocabulary. If they say ‘Ball’ say “Yes, the blue ball is bouncing across the room.”

Point out the colors in this book as you read to your young child. If your child knows their colors have them tell you the color in the text. For example, “Red feet in a yellow puddle make ____.” Once your child says “orange,” praise your child. “Good job! Red feet in a yellow puddle make orange!”

Your child’s understanding and use of colors grows as their language grows. They learn many concepts, including colors, through repetition. Repetition is the key for all of your child’s learning. Learning, or the growth of connections between brain cells, is strengthened through repetition. Repetition makes the connection between the brain cells strong and enables your child to remember what it is you are showing them. This is why children love to read the same story again, and again, and again!

Ice Cube Painting is a great way to play with colors and to learn what happens when you mix colors. Since this is a coloring mixing activity, start out with the three primary colors (red, blue and yellow).

To make the colored water, add at least 5 drops of food coloring to about ¼ cup of water. Mix well.

Spoon in the colors into each tray section by pairs to come up with the secondary colors—orange (yellow + red), green (yellow + blue), and purple (blue + red).

Kids love to mix colors so let them explore and learn!

Cover the tray with aluminum foil, poke craft sticks through the foil into the tray for handles, and put the tray inside the freezer.

Once frozen, remove the aluminum foil, give colors to your child and paint away!

When I see red, I put my hands on my head


When I see blue, I touch my shoe
