

My Friend Rabbit by Eric Rohmann



Print Awareness is knowing how to handle a book. My Friend Rabbit shows your child that some books have varying print orientations and need turned to read the text and see the illustrations. Play with the orientation of the book before you start reading it. Give the book to your child upside down. If your child does not turn the book the right way, tell your child you are turning it around so you can read it. Have your child turn the pages and see if she will turn the book when it needs turned. If she doesn't, say "Let's turn the book so we can read the words." Then underline the words as you read them with your finger.

Talk to your child about the illustrations as you read. Have your child guess how the characters are feeling based on their body language, frustrated, annoyed, sad, etc. The illustrations are great for emotions. Have children predict what might happen next. There are lots of "clues" as to what rabbit's plan is, as well as what eventually happens in the end.

Questions to ask your child after reading the book:

What other ways could they have gotten the plane out of the tree?

Why do you suppose Mouse did not get mad at Rabbit?

Do you think Rabbit had good ideas? Why?

If Mouse gets another new toy do you think he will let Rabbit play with it? Why?

Tell about a time when a friend helped you. Tell about a time when you helped a friend.

Bunny, Bunny


Bunny, white bunny
