## **Freight Train** by Donald Crews

<u>Freight Train</u> is a great book to introduce the early literacy skills *Talking* and *Narrative* to your child. Talking with children helps them to learn oral language. The Narrative Skill is the ability to understand, to tell stories, and to describe things. These are important for children being able to understand what they are learning to read.

An example of using this book to increase your child's narrative skills is for your child to tell you about the colors in the book, trains, transportation, or taking a trip. The experience of self-expression also stimulates brain development, which underlies all learning.

Make sure your child has lots of opportunities to talk with you, not just listen to you talk.

In <u>Freight Train</u> the different parts of a train are incorporated into the story. These are words that are not used in everyday conversations. At home: Stretch your child's vocabulary. Repeat what your child says and use new words.
